In the Episcopal Church, the Rector appoints the Senior Warden, and the Vestry then elects the Junior Warden. It was my privilege to appoint Ron Harrington as Senior Warden, and to join the Vestry in the unanimous election of Michael Harrigian as Junior Warden. Amy Hulick, though no longer on Vestry, has volunteered to continue as Clerk of Vestry, attending Vestry meetings. Gail Rolfe continues as our **Parish Treasurer**, without vote, though always with voice! Our customary Vestry gender balance is skewing male, and a greater number of women might want to consider standing for office at next year's 78th Annual Meeting and the election of the Vestry Class of 2021.

On Saturday February 10th the Vestry met in Retreat in the Parish Library with the Reverend Canon Joanna Satorius, Diocesan Canon for Transition. Canon Satorius spent five hours meticulously discussing the steps toward the discernment of the Eighth Rector of St. Edmund's Parish. All Vestry members left with great clarity regarding procedures in the Diocese of Los Angeles and in accord with the Canon Law of the Episcopal Church. Bob Wycoff summed up the general feeling of Vestry when he told Canon Satorius "My anxiety level has diminished by

about 90% thanks to our time with you today." Canon Satorius will work closely with St. Edmund's in weeks and months ahead.

Following Canon Satorius' departure, the Vestry selected a Transition Team to begin to guide the parish through the small group sessions which will eventually lead toward the development of a Parish Profile. In due course, following profile development, a Search Committee will be established. **The Transition Team** is comprised of:

The Transition Committee, Senior Warden Ron Harrington, and the Vestry will prove assiduous in keeping the parish current on all procedural steps through occasional mailings, gatherings, Sunday announcements, Sunday bulletin notes, Edmund's Notes and all pertinent means of communication.

It is not too soon to embrace this Collect during your daily devotions:



EASTER FLOWERS AND LILIES

The Altar Guild is committed to act as prudent stewards of your weekly, Easter, and Christmas flower offerings. As such, we have established a 2018 budget of \$2,500 for Palm Sunday and Easter. It is a tight budget but one that we know will work, with your support.

Our tradition during Lent is to not have fresh flowers in the Chapel and Church, but

Financial Update: Actuals vs. Budget

Actual key financial figures for 2016 and 2017 compared to the 2018 budget:

Pledge Income	<u>2018 Budget</u> \$ 375,000	<u>Actual 2017</u> \$ 413,742	<u>Actual 2016</u> \$ 357,390
Total Income	\$ 581,122	\$ 745,066	\$ 788,092
Expenses	\$ 628,258	\$ 852,769	\$ 881,952

Budget cuts in 2018 include 10% reduction in salaries, a 30% reduction in the music budget, the elimination of the hospitality and outreach budgets, a 50% reduction in the repairs and maintenance budget, a 75% reduction in the website maintenance budget, and other various smaller reductions.

The anticipated 2018 deficit is expected to be fully funded with a combination of savings and unrestricted gifts from the Next 75 Initiative. The goal of 2018 is to develop and implement a plan which will allow the parish to fully fund its goal of a \$6MM endowment or otherwise balance its budget for the future.

We currently have \$1.3MM in our new true endowment and another \$200,000plus is committed for payment in 2018.

FROM OUR YOUTH DIRECTOR

Children's Liturgy

Our children are learning lots with our Children's Liturgy, every Sunday at 10 am in the Chapel. The students take part in every aspect of the service and are learning details about liturgical colors, candles and water. Students are encouraged to explore, ask questions and feel an ownership of the space and of worship.

After Children's Liturgy we go to the Sunday school rooms for our lesson, crafts and games. We have begun studying the book of Matthew which will take us through to Palm Sunday.

NOTE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN ON OUR RECTOR'S TRANSITION

This last Tuesday, pitchers and catchers reported to spring training! Throughout Arizona and Florida, every major league baseball team began working full time on a process that will end months from now with a new world champion. For now, a quiet process has begun as each team works on fundamentals: developing player skills, character, and making tough roster decisions before the season begins. I imagine, inside the teams, the work is hard and players' lives are far from idyllic, as cuts and trades come day after day. For fans though, blessed to watch a little removed, it is just a glorious spring, full of fresh expectations, green grass, sunshine, and limitless opportunities.

We are entering a quiet period in our rector transition process. Shortly after Fr. George announced his plans to leave St. Edmund's after 23 successful years, we had a warm meeting with Bishop Taylor and were assured of his complete support for our parish throughout the transition. The Vestry then met with the Rev. Canon Joanna Satorius from the Diocese Office for Clergy Formation and Transitional Ministries. Canon Satorius will be assisting us in the rector search process, and she spent a full day describing the transition process recommended by the Diocese.

We are beginning this process immediately. Gail Rolfe has agreed to lead a newly formed Transition Committee as its Chair; Mike Harrigian, serving as a liaison to the Vestry; Amy Hulick, Debra Spaulding and Alan Steinbrecher also as members.

This committee is intended to provide continuity and guidance throughout the rector transition process. The calling of a new rector is going to take an extended period of time, and the Vestry has not put a timetable or expected end date on the process. Canon Satorius advised us that the most thoughtful, wise approaches to the rector calling require much information gathering, team building, and reflection on the character of our parish.

We expect to begin arranging small group discussions to address this step soon. Additional parishioners with time and interest will need to be involved throughout, too. So, if you can volunteer time, your help will be welcomed. If you can only cheer or boo, we will welcome that too! Your feedback as to what we are doing well, what we need to do differently, ministries that are currently important to you, and what is not now adequately provided will need to serve as the basis for a coming St. Edmund's profile that will serve as a foundation for our search.

We do need to ask for your immediate help. Continue to support St. Edmund's, mostly with your attendance at services, but as you can, in the small groups offered through Lent. This will be a time to especially appreciate the remaining sermons and homilies from Fr. George! Please stay current on your pledges, and if possible, prepay before summer.

But most importantly, remember us in your prayers:

- For Fr. George, our friend and Rector for 23 years, as he goes through transition too, deserving of our full and complete support, and with thanks for his service;
- For St. Edmund's, as we work through the process of our new rector calling; and,
- For our Vestry and others leading this process, they will need wisdom, grace and all the support you can give.

We are just beginning, and to be sure, there are challenges ahead. But for now, let's enjoy a glorious spring.
